After visiting the Sea of Galilee, it is no wonder Jesus chose this location to be the base of His ministry. Watching the sun rise over the eastern mountains was a sight I will never forget. I think what I liked the most was realizing that the sea had not changed. Yes, the landscape around it has, the nice hotel we were staying at was not there in the time of Jesus, but the water, the view across the lake, the sunrise in the morning, these were all views Jesus saw. There is nothing quite like taking a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee, being surrounded by such a beautiful scenery of mountains and aqua water. You can feel like you are right there in the Biblical stories, as Jesus would journey multiple times across this lake.

The Sea of Galilee is such an interesting place. The sea is heart shaped and is roughly 12 miles long and 7 miles across at its widest point. It is the lowest freshwater lake on the earth at 700 feet below sea level. It is this low elevation and being surrounded by mountains that makes it an ideal place for storms to arise quickly. Wind will funnel down the mountains and because the mountains block the view you can't see the storm coming until it is already on top of you. Even to this day storms can happen that cause up to ten-foot waves. The small surface area could get to churning in a hurry which made travel and fishing dangerous on the sea. In the northwest lies the small fishing villages of Capernaum, Bethsaida, Magdala and Gennesaret, these were Jewish communities, and the region Jesus chose to base His ministry. To the northeast was Gamla, the town the Zealots called home; they were close to their religious cousins but still separate in how they chose to live. On

the west coast was Tiberias, a city that Herod would frequent often, and few religious Jews would live. Finally on the eastern side was the region of the Decapolis, 10 cities that were mostly pagan and Hellenistic, very different from the towns just across the water.

I love that this is where Jesus chose to be. For him it was not a diverse region of territories, but rather a terrain connected by a simple boat ride. Where others saw borders and barriers, Jesus saw brokenness and bereavement. Danielle Shroyer says this, "Galilee's borders may have been separated into quadrants, but Jesus traveled in that boat like a divine sewing needle, stitching up people who had come apart, stitching people together from every regional fabric lining the shores." Where Jesus Prayed We get multiple accounts of Jesus crossing the lake, he goes back and forth trying to connect these various groups that have become divided over time. He lives his life in the in between and finding ways to bring groups together. Of course we know what happens when you bring various groups together. There is friction, there are storms, and of course in the middle of the sea, this middle ground of religion, culture, and politics, we find Jesus calming the storms and walking on the water.

In Hebrew culture the water was seen as a symbol of chaos and evil. It was the frightful abyss, the deep, the unknown. This is why the disciples are so fearful when a storm comes and why they think Jesus is a ghost when he comes walking to them on the water. I love this image though, in the middle of our chaos is where we find Jesus, he comes walking on top of the chaos, he is the master of chaos. He brings order to what we are facing, he calms the waves and stills the wind. Jesus is still in the business of connecting our lives and bringing order out of the chaos of our lives. The Sea of Galilee is a beautiful place, but it symbolizes so much for us as followers of Jesus. It was on the shores of the sea where Jesus called the first disciples, it was the sea that he used to connect various cultures and regions together, and it was the sea that symbolized the chaos of the world to which he came to silence. In this one picture of a sunrise over the water we see all of this, calling, connection, and creating order out of chaos. The overarching Biblical story being shared through the landscape of this beautiful place.

On our trip we got to take a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee. As we were riding out the captain was playing music over the speakers. He could have played any song, any hymn but the song that was playing was Kristine DiMarco's It Is Well. This is a contemporary song that combines the lyrics of the hymn It Is Well with newer lyrics. This song means so much to me because it was the song I listened to over and over again after my mom passed away. It was where I found comfort in that difficult part of my life, and here I was in the middle of the Sea of Galilee with Jesus still speaking, still calming the waves, still quieting the chaos. It was a reminder that His love is very real and ever present, that death and chaos do not have the final word, it was a calming of the storm of grief and loss because Jesus still traverses the waters of chaos in our lives to bring order. The bridge of the song says, "let go my soul and trust in Him the waves and wind still know His name." My prayer for each of us is to let go and trust because the waves and wind still know his name. The mountains still rise in praise the water still renews our spirits, creation continues to remind us that Jesus travels through the in between places of our lives to connect us, to calm our storms, and to create order in our chaos. The waves and wind still know His name. Amen!
